



#### Fun Facts:

- Number of events: 175
- Number of Hosts: 100+
- Number of Attendees: ~9,000
- Number of People on Reimagine Team (including Rachel): 5
- Advance Care Planning: 21 events focused on the topic; 10 events at libraries, including two hosted by the VA focused on benefits for Veterans.
- Many artists, speakers and workshop leaders partnered with CBOs for programming – waiving their services fees.
- 13 Houses of Worship participated directly in Conversation Sabbath and another 10 reported leading end of life programming leading up to or directly following Reimagine Week. And, the SF Interfaith Council engaged the topic at their monthly meetings.

#### Some Highlights:

- Self-Help for the Elderly – 116 Cantonese speaking seniors came to a presentation on advance care planning
- Mercy Housing - in partnership with Reimagine artists, presenters, staff and PCWG members produced 6 events
- Aquatic Park Senior Center - produced a day-long event with speakers, film, art projects and a week-long installation
- Laguna Honda - 3 events – one each for clinicians, families and the general community – setting model for hospital participation
- African American Arts + Culture Complex - hosted three events
- California College of the Arts did a day long, multi-faceted set of events and engaged design students in multiple disciplines on end of life.

#### PCWG Highlights

- Megory Anderson and Eric Weiss teamed up to make Conversation Sabbath happen
- Redwing Keyssar made The End of Life Project possible with an attendance of about 1000
- Megory also hosted her own event through Sacred Dying Foundation
- Anne Hughes ran three events at Laguna Honda Hospital AFTER retirement
- Anne and Eric helped run a session on getting The Conversation started at Mercy Housing
- Kelly Dearman and George Kellar teamed up to produce the True Story Theater/Advance Care Planning workshop at the AAACC
  - And Zen Hospice Project ran three workshops and the PA ran an ACP workshop of their own.
- Eric Weiss invited Rachel Lovett and Kelly Dearman on to Mosaic to highlight Reimagine week and the importance of palliative care and advance care planning and got Reimagine featured in J weekly.
- Rebecca Sudore and team stepped up their timeline on producing a training video for PREPARE and ran three of our library workshops. Rebecca also spoke at LHH.

- Rachel Main ran a Dementia and Advance Care Planning workshop
- Anne Fabiny connected us at the VA
- Shireen McSpadden connected us to Tom Nolan who helped us get both the MTA space gratis and the rotunda at City Hall for Daybreaker gratis.
- Christine Ritchie and Rebecca Sudore weighed in on the Preparation section of the Memory Box and Christine was instrumental in developing Reimagine pre-and post-survey questions for the research required by the Stupski Grant.
